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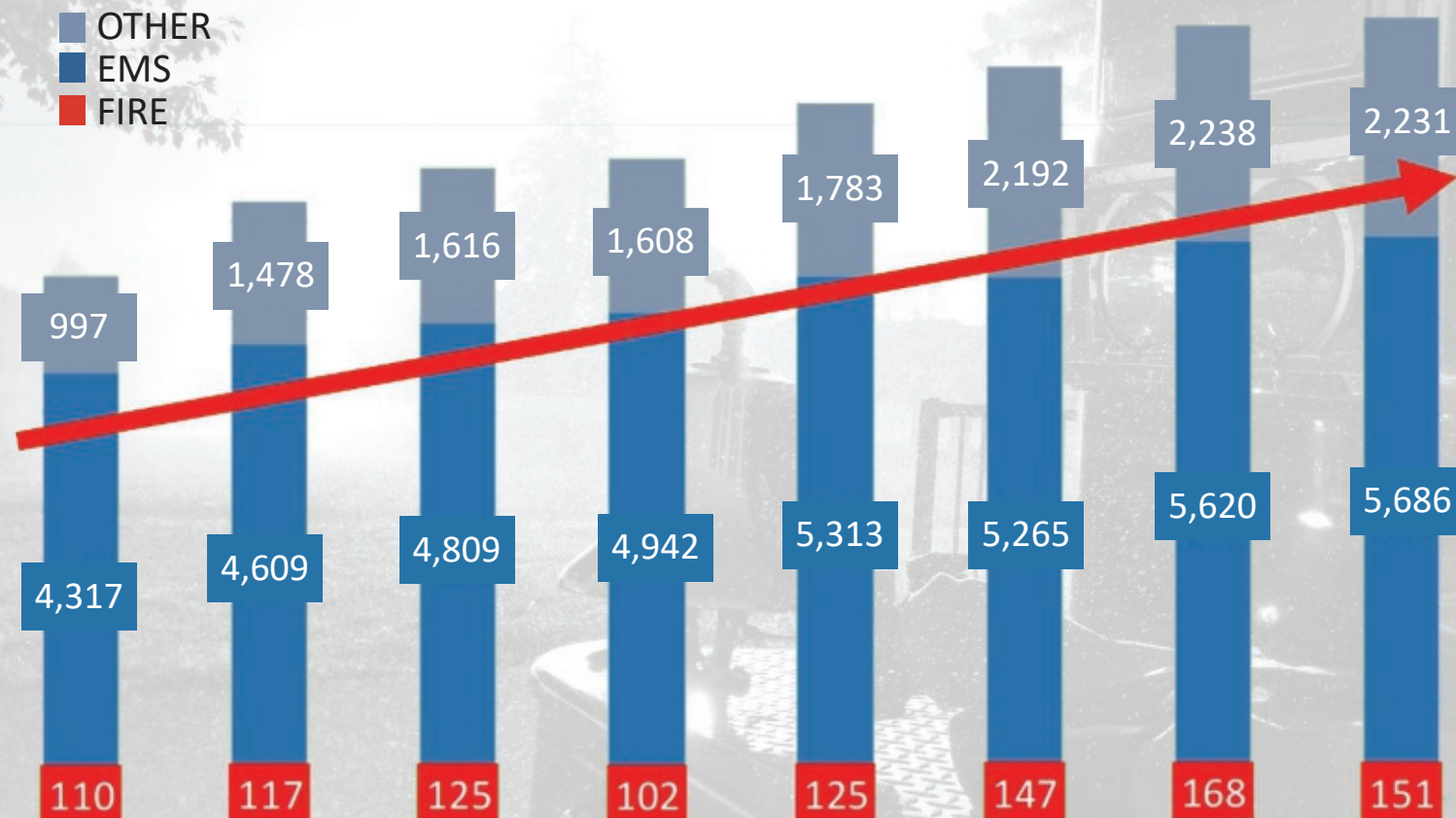

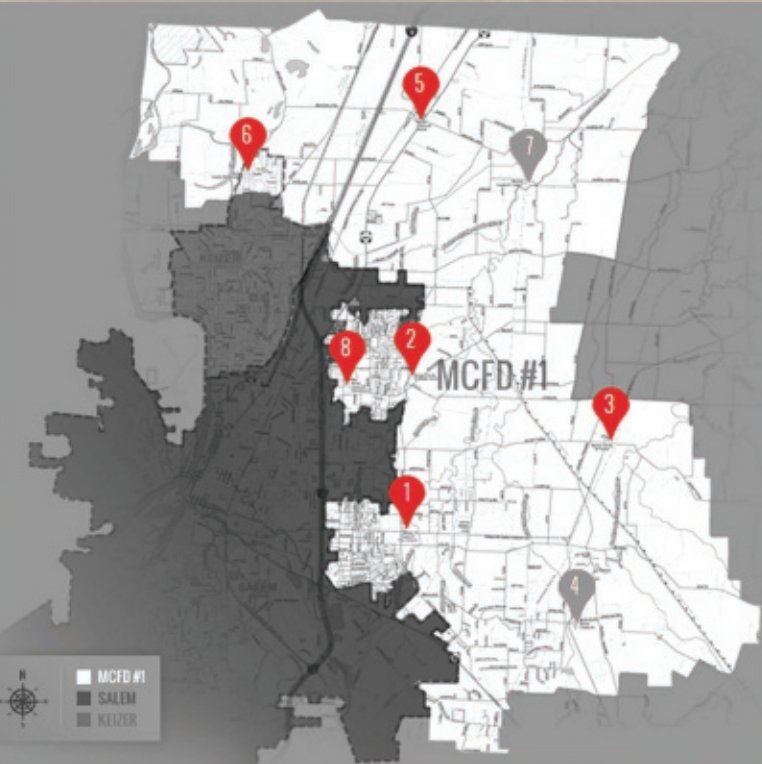

8, E305 provides that area’s “First Due” Engine coverage. Lastly, MCFD1 staffs three ALS ambulances at Stations 1, 2, and 6 (south, central, and north respectively), plus two reserve medics as a back-up unit.

A Message from Fire Chief Kyle McMann

Dear Neighbor,

Thank you for the opportunity to serve. Marion County Fire District #1 provides fire and emergency medical services to 55,000 people over 80 square miles. Full-time and volunteer emergency personnel respond to approximately 8,100 calls per year – 50 percent higher than seven years ago.

This has been an unprecedented year for our community and MCFD#1 due to COVID-19. We have missed the face-to-face interaction with you. Social media provided an opportunity to fill this gap with a virtual platform for story time, station and apparatus tours; however, we are looking forward to welcoming you back to our stations in person.

The pandemic also has reinforced just how important emergency services are to families. Call volumes have continued to increase at a time when we’re operating with 12 fewer firefighter/paramedics. We laid off personnel, closed stations and took apparatus out of service when our local option levy failed last year. This levy accounted for 30 percent or \$2.4 million annually to provide emergency services.

Response times have jumped by more than a minute already. To put that in perspective, fires double in size every 30 seconds. In 60 seconds, muscle and brain damage can occur for heart attack and stroke victims.

At times, there are no emergency response units available, or just one to cover all 80 square miles of the district. Our community is frustrated with a slower response, and so are we.

Current staffing levels are unsafe for the public and firefighters. MCFD#1 is asking voters to approve a smaller local option levy during the May 18, 2021 election. Funding would be used to improve response times by filling nine of the 12 emergency responder positions that were cut, and placing a dedicated and fully-staffed fire engine back in service 24 hours a day.

The levy would last for five years and cost \$59 yearly or \$4.92 a month, per \$100,000 of your home’s assessed value. (A home’s assessed value is lower than its market value.) More information about can be found on our website at [www.mcfcd1.com](http://www.mcfcd1.com).
